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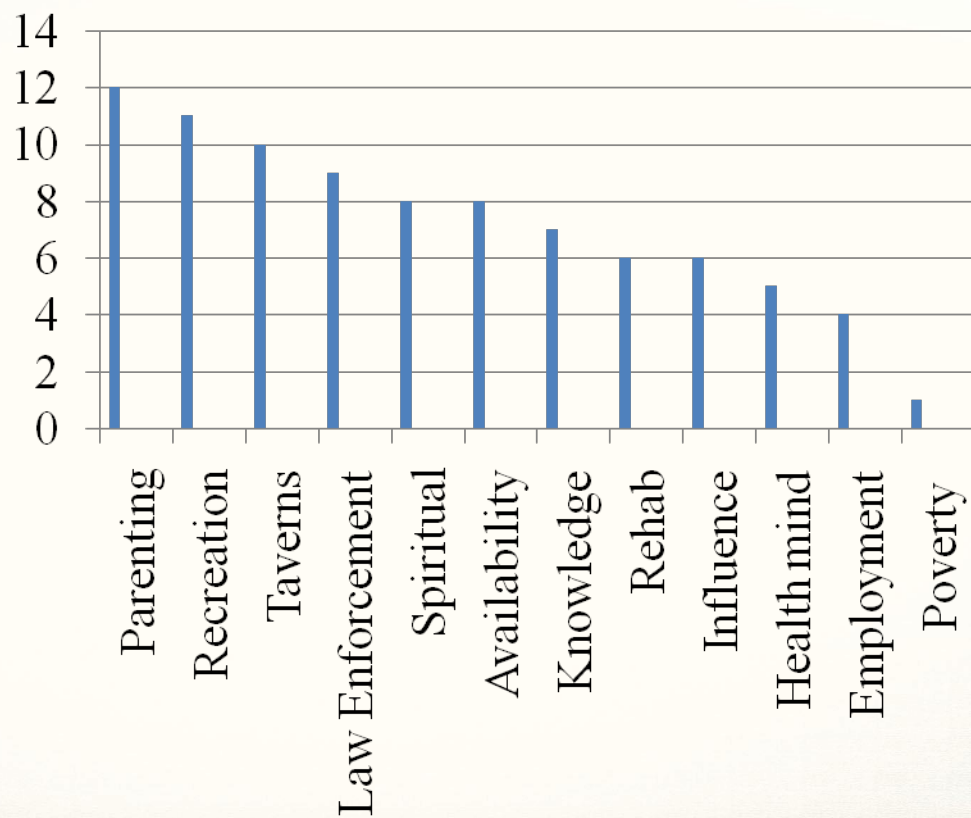
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## COMMUNITY NEEDS IN ORDER OF PRIORITY

7	Raising duties and taxes on alcohol	Reduction



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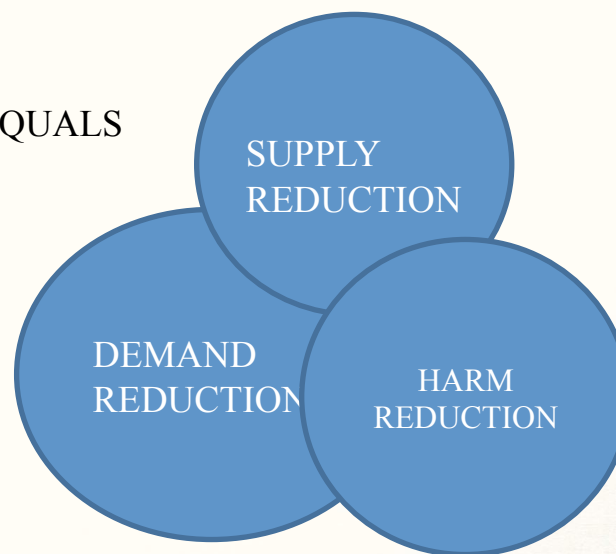

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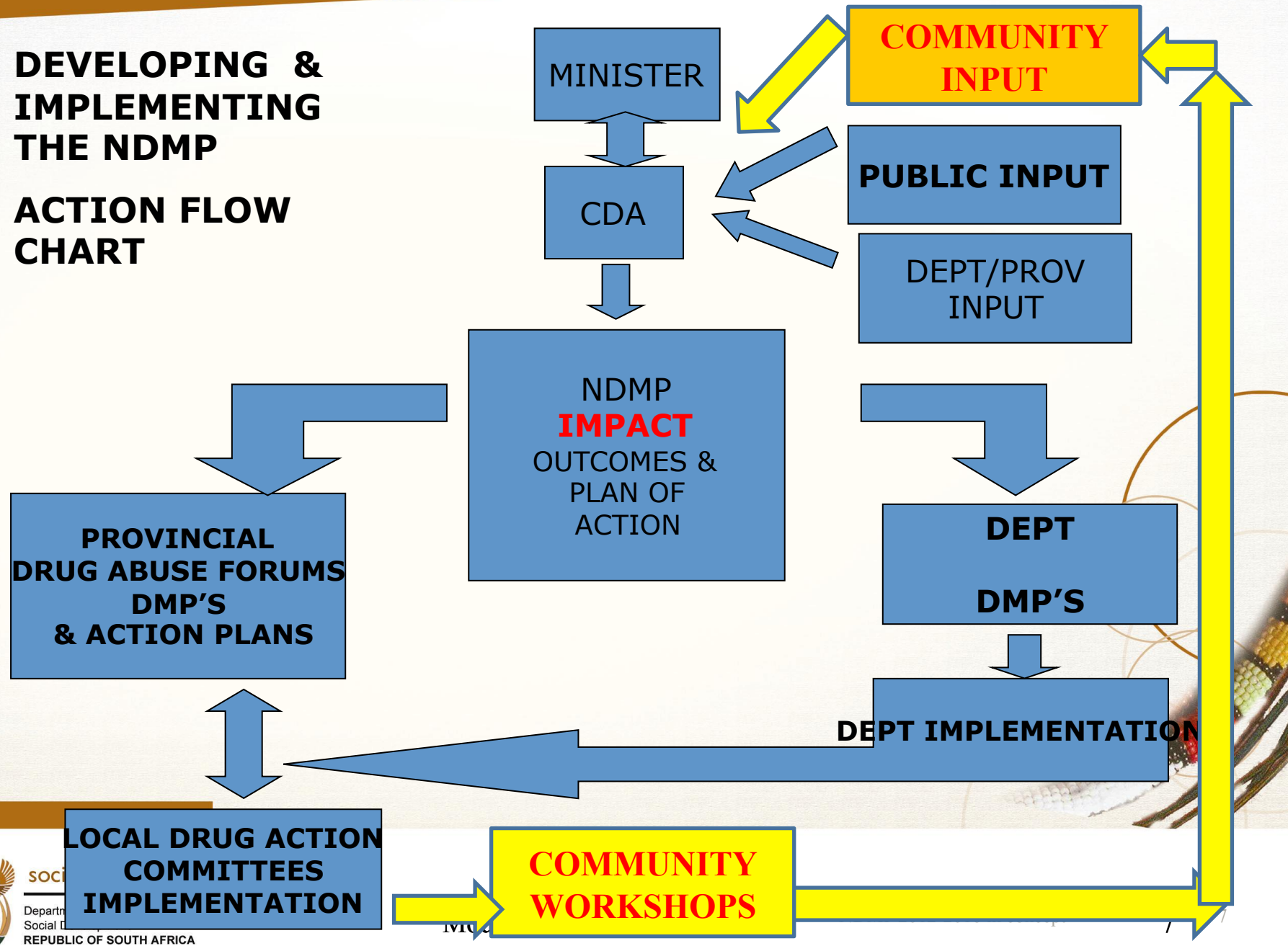
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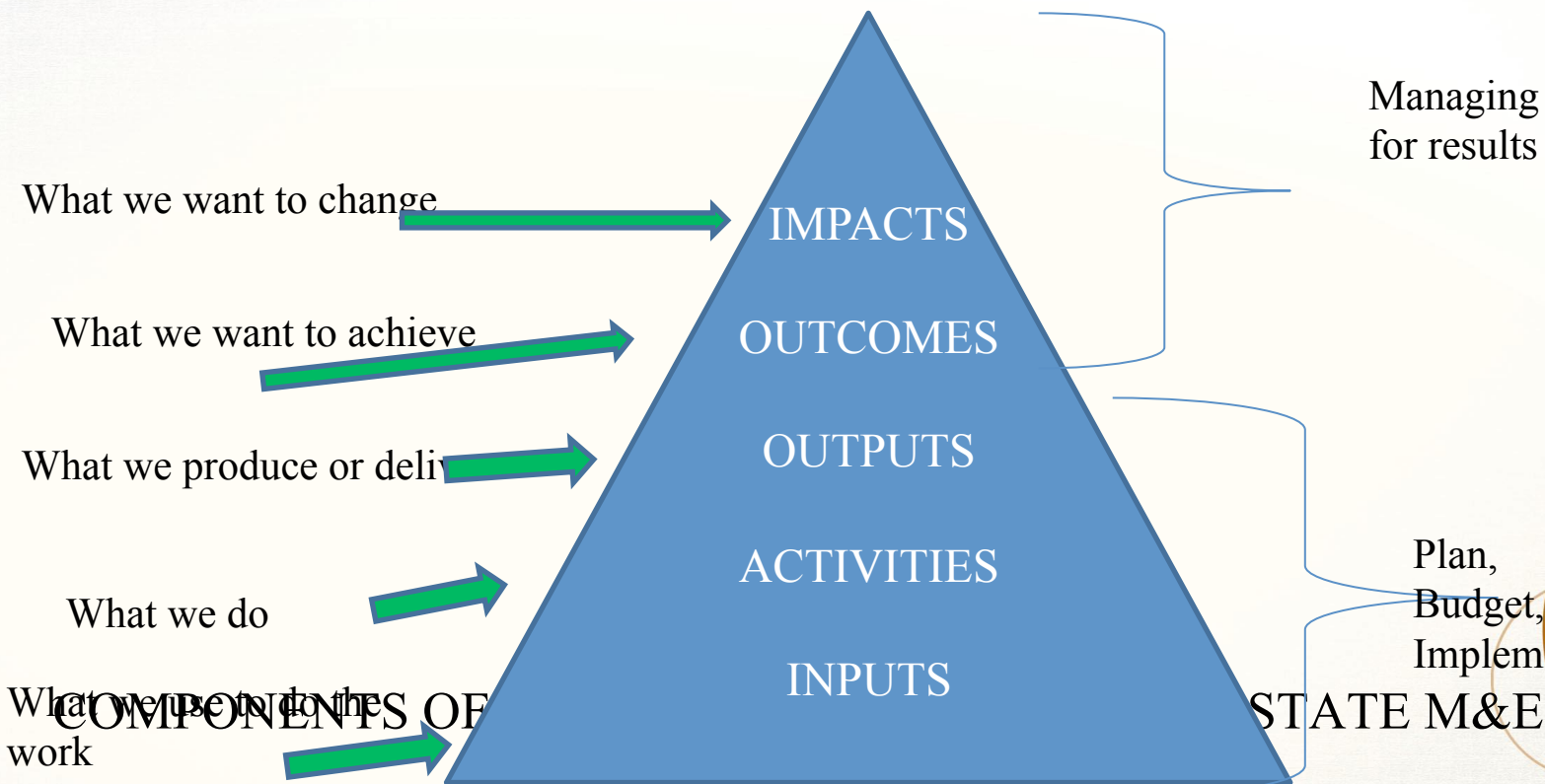
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# DEVELOPING & IMPLEMENTING THE NDMP

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# KEY OUTCOMES OF NDMP

## 2012-2016 (pp 74-79 of draft NDMP)

1. Reduced bio-,socio-economic impact of substance abuse and related illnesses
2. People able to deal with substance abuse within communities
3. Recreation and diversion facilities prevent dependence
4. Availability of dependence-forming drugs and alcohol reduced
5. Integrated diagnosis, treatment and aftercare funded and implemented
6. Laws and policies facilitate effective governance of alcohol and drug supply chain
7. Job opportunities in combating substance created

# NDMP OUTCOMES AND DEPARTMENTAL/ PROVINCIAL OUTPUTS (pp 79-95 of draft NDMP)

e.g. NDMP outcome 1= Dept/province output 1 adapted to dept and province needs = Dept and Provincial DMP

Activities	Indicators	Baseline	Targets	Functional Area
Implement summit resolutions	% reduction bio-socio-economic impact	Research report	Not less than 10%	Nat'l depts/provinces

# EVIDENCE-BASED ACTIVITIES/OBJECTIVES/ INTERVENTIONS (pp 43-50 of Draft NDMP)

International research into effectiveness of interventions shows e.g.

Alcohol: Most effective are:

- Restrictions on affordability
- Availability
- Accessibility, and
- Drink-driving deterrence measures

Drugs,: No single effective policy

- Unintended consequences
- Crop destruction does not reduce supply
- Increased punishment yields little benefit
- Prevention programmes have modest impact
- Integrated interventions better



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## IN CONCLUSION

- CHANGING CONDITIONS NECESSITATE CHANGE TO STRATEGIC CONCEPT OF NDMP
- KEY CHANGES INVOLVE:
  - COMMUNITY NEEDS PROVIDE BASIS FOR IMPACT OF NDMP
  - STRATEGIC CHANGE TO EMPHASISE PRIMARY PREVENTION IN INTEGRATED STRATEGY
  - INTERVENTIONS EVIDENCE-BASED
  - INTRODUCTION OF MONITORING AND EVALUATION
  - ADAPTATION OF NDMP AND DMP TO M&E APPROACH AND TERMINOLOGY
  - R& D DIRECTED TO MEETING NEEDS
  - REPORTING IN TERMS OF OUTPUTS/INSTEAD OF ACTIVITIES
  - EXTENDING REPORTING BASE TO INCLUDE NON-CDA SOURCES AND LINKED DATABASES
- CO-ORDINATION OF EFFORTS THROUGH CDA SUPPORTING INFRASTRUCTURE
